Three-toothed orchid

Neotinea tridentata (Scop.) R.M.Bateman & al.

DESCRIPTION

A small and robust orchid with a dense oval inflorescence of up to 30 usually pale pink flowers. The upper pink-veined sepals and petals form a hood above the lip of the flower. The lip is deeply lobed, pale and covered with red dots.

HABITAT

Open grassland, phrygana (garrigue) and open woodland.





DISTRIBUTION

Southern and central Europe, reaching Poland and Germany to the north and extending to the Caucasus in the southeast.

DANGER

The species is quite widespread and abundant. Like most European orchids, its main threats are represented by habitat destruction.
